he St. Malo Catholic Camps have been running for twentysix years. We are starting to see the second generation of families come to camps, both as campers and as counselors. Christine Sevi (nee Jeanson) and her fourteen year old daughter Kafui are one such pairing.

"My first time at the CSE was in 1994,when I was a thirteen year old camper," Christine told us when we sat down with her and her daughter. "When I was about fifteen, the director Gilbert asked me if I would want to be a counselor. So I said OK. Well, actually, I said no, that I'd try to find another job and if I couldn't then I'd come. And I couldn't find anything else. So I went, and I loved it. And then I just kept going every summer. I became head women's counselor, and then head counselor, and finally camp coordinator. I loved

the camp ministry. I loved it better than being a camper. After I graduated from high school, I became a student at the CSE."

She loved the friendships she made during her time working at camps, especially because at high school she was an "undercover Christian" and found it hard to share her faith openly. Those camp friends are still her good friends today. She also found that being

put on the spot to give her testimony as a camp leader helped her to refine her understanding of who God is in her life. "My faith had to become real, because I had to be real with the campers."

Christine recalls one young camper, from the 8-10 year old group, who was having a difficult time

the whole week. His behaviour had escalated to a point where, as camp coordinator, she needed to intervene. With some gentle coaxing, he opened up to her, sharing some struggles he was having at home. Her influence outside of camp was limited, but she was able to connect with the boy's father and inform him of the problems, which vastly improved the boy's situation. Today, years later, she still sees that camper from time to time, and while she doesn't know if he remembers that intervention, she feels blessed to have played a part in his healing.

Her time at the CSE was in a different season of our ministry. Although she misses the discontinued discipleship formation program, she sees great potential for future leader development with the full time position of a camp director, which Gabrielle Champagne is now filling. Christine recognizes that Gabrielle's monthly formation meetings, for next year's slate of counselors, will be an important factor in the

development and growth of that team.

Kafui, Christine's eldest daughter, had her first experience as an eight year old camper in 2013. When the family moved to British Columbia, Christine wondered if her kids would ever get another chance to participate in CSE programming. But they moved back to Manitoba last year, and this summer was Kafui's first chance to be a camp counselor, for two weeks. "There

was some relief," says Christine. "For teenagers, your peers become so important, and as parents we want them to have good friends. And as much as she had a rough summer due to the challenges they faced, she just can't wait to go back. I don't think parents realize how much their kid is actually learning as a counselor."

"I wanted to be a counselor," says Kafui, "because my other friends who've done it say it's very challenging and yet very fun. I wanted to spend more time with them and get to know them better because we share the same faith."

When Christine picked up Kafui after the counselor training week, her first thought was, "Ahh, I've missed this," she says, smiling wistfully. "But then it quickly faded when I remembered the energy needed to be a counselor. I'm very happy that she liked it. It's a struggle for me to be without her help at home when she's at camp, but it's worth it."

Christine, looking at her own siblings and their experiences at the CSE, points out that not all teens are necessarily called to be counselors, and that the other camp positions of kitchen assistant, custodian, lifeguard, or many other background roles can have their own rewards. "The whole CSE community experience, the spirit of accompaniment, and being authentic in our faith are the most important parts of working at camps. It's such a good complement to what we're trying to do as parents."

Now that she and her daughter have both had this powerful experience of being a counselor, their relationship has a new shared dimension.

"When Kafui came back from her first week, because I know how intense and exhausting a week of camp work is, I gave her the next day off from chores and let her sleep in, and I prepped my other kids to give her some space," recalls Christine.

Kafui greatly appreciates having a mother who understands what it's like. "One of the other counselors told me that when she got home, her mom said, 'OK, get to work, you've missed a whole week of chores." Then, with a proud smile, she adds, "My mom gets it."







eciding to spend a second year serving at the CSE, the Kautz family shares about God's Providence throughout their first year:

At the beginning of our married life we took great joy in surrendering to God's will, of praying the "dangerous prayer" — "Lord, whatever you want me to do, I will do." When our family heard the call to commit to a year of service at the CSE, we were not

sure what would happen when that year was up. Our younger kids had to change schools, we had to put our involvement in volunteer activities in the city on hold, and we had to rent out our house. God's hand was clearly visible in making each of those changes happen smoothly. It felt like the cluttered table of our lives was being swept clean for something else.

As the summer of 2018 approached, all we knew for sure was that we would move in to the CSE in late August 2018, and that we would need to vacate our rooms in early July 2019 in order to make room for that

year's summer camp program.

That first year here was hard, but good. It was hard because of the logistical problems of an old building, teenage girl drama, mental health challenges, our mischievous boys, the commute, a new baby, and marriage struggles. But it was good because we all improved our work ethic in making a large place like this beautiful and ready for groups to use. It was good because we grew spiritually through participation in the retreats here. It was good because we deepened our

family purpose and communion. It was good because of the deepening friendships with the CSE staff. It was good because we had our very own chapel in which to do personal and family prayer time. It was good because God answered when we called out to him.

Our renters in Winnipeg were committed through June of 2019, so we knew have a place to return home to in the summer.

we'd have a place to return home to in the summer. That was our plan, anyway. They are recent immigrants and faithful Catholics who came to Canada to be with their family here, and were hoping to rent short-term while they searched for something permanent. But that

search has proved difficult for them. And since we had discerned to commit to a second year at the CSE, it didn't make sense for us to move back to our Winnipeg house for a handful of weeks, especially because our renters still needed a place to live. Once again we felt like God was asking us to trust him in a radical way. And once again, he met our needs.

Years ago, Dawn had met a woman whose family lived on a farm near Morris. A chance Facebook post brought them together again. Her family was planning an extended trip to Europe with their children, during the exact - yes, exact - window of time that we needed a place to stay. They had been desperately seeking somebody to watch their laying hens and care for the home while they were away. The house was more than big enough for us, and our children quickly learned how to care for chickens and collect eggs. Those weeks of relative calm living there were a much needed break from a busy year.

As for what will happen at the end of this year, only God knows. All we know is that he'll call us to radical trust again.

Stan Scott has been a behind the
scenes volunteer at the Catholic

Whenever I was worried for someone, or going through something difficult myself, I offered it up while I painted. Looking back on the paintings I see my past year, where my heart was at each saint. St. Joseph's Carpentry & Renovations. He has a young family, and as his children are approaching camp age, he inquired in the spring if he would be able to contribute some volunteer hours to improve the CSE's building for the next generation of campers. His initial idea was to beautify our chapel, but after touring the building he realized a greater need was to make the old basement a usable space.

If you're not familiar with the old basement, it's directly beneath the dining room and kitchen. It's an open area with lots of potential as a multi-use room. The walls and ceiling are finished, but the floor is bare concrete, and there was a lot of storage clutter. In the heat of summer, there is also a moisture problem which we've mitigated by running dehumidifiers constantly. This, however, merely replaces the moisture problem with a noise problem, and that along with the clutter made the space largely unusable.

We purged the storage this past spring. Centre Flavie-Laurent sent a cube van which we filled with surplus desks, tables, foam mattresses, etc. Other broken items were taken to the landfill or suitable recycling depots. This left us with a lot more room for

This Fall, Lionel has donated thirteen working days here. Among other smaller projects, he built an interior storage room to separate a section of the basement for storage of tables and chairs. Then, to work towards a solution for the moisture problem, he gutted the utility area of the basement. These walls were very old concrete, poorly insulated and with no vapor barrier and they leak during heavy rains. He installed new framing in preparation for insulation. Traditional fiberglass batting was considered, but spray foam was chosen as the right solution for the space given the age of the walls, seepage, and the numerous small, tight spaces which would need to be insulated in that utility area. With the help of a team of volunteers, he turned his attention to installing some donated flooring in a few of the older dorm rooms and in the basement.

And he is still hoping to get to his dream of beautifying the chapel.

His example has inspired others, too. Cladan Electric donated some time doing upgrades and repairs. Habitat for Humanity's newest ReStore donated new flooring which is, at the time of this writing, sitting in the prop room awaiting installation. Phil Grenier, from Toupin Plumbing and Heating, installed a new water heater to replace a leaky one in that utility room.

- Landscaping to remediate our water problems in the old basement
- Tree servicing to remove dead branches
- Repainting the basement, the boardroom, and the chapel
- Locksmithing to help us reduce the dozens of keys we need around here
- Electrical work to rewire our fluorescent fixtures to LED tubes (we have dozens of them!)
- Repairing a ball joint on our van
- Kitchen cabinetry repairs / updates
- Plumbing to replace some old sinks / toilets
